JAMES JOSEPH MOZZILLO, M.D., says:

On or about July 1, 1980, I was licensed to practice medicine as a physician in the State of New York having been issued License No. 142569 by the New York State Education Department. I currently reside at 3117 Lapidary Lane, Janesville, WI 53545.

I am not currently registered with the New York State Education Department to practice as a physician in the State of New York.

I understand that the New York State Board for Professional Medical Conduct has charged me with two (2) specifications of professional misconduct as set forth in the Statement of Charges, annexed hereto, made a part hereof, and marked as Exhibit "A."

I have not practice medicine in New York state in twenty year (20) and I do not intend to return to practice medicine in New York state. I, therefore, am applying to the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct for an agreement to allow me to surrender my license as a physician in the State of New York and request that the Board issue this Surrender Order.

I, hereby, agree not to contest Factual Allegations A and B(3) and (5) and the two (2) specifications set forth in the Statement of Charges (Exhibit A).

I understand that, in the event that this proposed agreement is not granted by the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct, nothing contained herein shall be binding upon me or construed to be an admission of any act of misconduct alleged or charged against me, such proposed agreement shall not be used against me in any way, and shall be kept in strict

confidence during the pendency of the professional misconduct disciplinary proceeding; and such denial by the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct shall be made without prejudice to the continuance of any disciplinary proceeding and the final determination by a Committee on Professional Medical Conduct pursuant to the provisions of the Public Health Law.

I agree that, in the event the Board grants my Application, as set forth herein, an order of the Chairperson of the Board shall be issued in accordance with same upon issuance by the Board, which may be accomplished by mailing, by first class mail, a copy of the Order to me at the address set forth above, or to my attorney, or upon transmission via facsimile to me or my attorney, whichever is first.

I am making this agreement of my own free will and accord and not under duress, compulsion, or restraint of any kind of manner.



STATEMENT
OF
CHARGES

JAMES JOSEPH MOZZILLO, M.D., the Respondent, was authorized to practice medicine in New York state on July 1, 1980, by the issuance of license number 142569 by the New York State Education Department.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

A. On or about October 18, 2000, the State of Wisconsin, Medical Examining Board (hereinafter "Wisconsin Board"), by a Final Decision and Order (hereinafter "Wisconsin Order"), reprimanded the Respondent, required him to pay \$250.00 costs, and imposed conditions, based on having consumed hydrocodone, a controlled substance, without a prescription from another practitioner, having dispensed hydrocodone and other controlled substances to relatives and friends without patient health care records or dispensing records and logs, and not having secured the controlled substances against theft.

B. The conduct resulting in the Wisconsin Board disciplinary action against Respondent would constitute misconduct under the laws of New York state, pursuant to the following sections of New York state Law:

1. New York Education Law §6530(2) (practicing the profession fraudulently);
2. New York Education Law §6530(3) (negligence on more than one occasion);
3. New York Education Law §6530(16) (failure to comply with federal, state, or local laws, rules or regulations, governing the practice of medicine);

4. New York Education Law §6530(24) (practicing beyond the scope permitted by law); and/or
5. New York Education Law §6530(32) (inadequate recordkeeping).

SPECIFICATIONS
FIRST SPECIFICATION

Respondent violated New York Education Law §6530(9)(b) by having been found guilty of improper professional practice or professional misconduct by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of another state where the conduct upon which the finding was based would, if committed in New York state, constitute professional misconduct under the laws of New York state, in that Petitioner charges:

1. The facts in paragraphs A and/or B.

SECOND SPECIFICATION

Respondent violated New York Education Law §6530(9)(d) by having had disciplinary action taken after a disciplinary action was instituted by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of another state, where the conduct resulting in the disciplinary action would, if committed in New York state, constitute professional misconduct under the laws New York state, in that Petitioner charges:

2. The facts in paragraphs A and/or B.

ORDER


