Dear Parties:

Enclosed please find the Determination and Order (No. 02-74) of the Hearing Committee in the above referenced matter. This Determination and Order shall be deemed effective upon the receipt or seven (7) days after mailing by certified mail as per the provisions of §230, subdivision 10, paragraph (h) of the New York State Public Health Law.

Five days after receipt of this Order, you will be required to deliver to the Board of Professional Medical Conduct your license to practice medicine together with the registration certificate. Delivery shall be by either certified mail or in person to:

If your license or registration certificate is lost, misplaced or its whereabouts is otherwise unknown, you shall submit an affidavit to that effect. If subsequently you locate the requested items, they must then be delivered to the Office of Professional Medical Conduct in the manner noted above.

As prescribed by the New York State Public Health Law §230, subdivision 10, paragraph (i), and §230-c subdivisions 1 through 5, (McKinney Supp. 1992), "the determination of a committee on professional medical conduct may be reviewed by the Administrative Review Board for professional medical conduct." Either the licensee or the Department may seek a review of a committee determination.

Request for review of the Committee's determination by the Administrative Review Board stays penalties other than suspension or revocation until final determination by that Board. Summary orders are not stayed by Administrative Review Board reviews.

All notices of review must be served, by certified mail, upon the Administrative Review Board and the adverse party within fourteen (14) days of service and receipt of the enclosed Determination and Order.

The parties shall have 30 days from the notice of appeal in which to file their briefs to the Administrative Review Board. Parties will be notified by mail of the Administrative Review Board's Determination and Order.

A hearing was held on February 20, 2002, at the offices of the New York State Department of Health ("the Petitioner"). A Notice of Referral Proceeding and a Statement of Charges, both dated December 5, 2001, were served upon the Respondent, **Suhung Hann, M.D., a/k/a Richard Suhung Hann, M.D.** Ernst A. Kopp, M.D., Chairperson, Jinil Yoo, M.D., and Sister Mary Theresa Murphy, duly designated members of the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct, served as the Hearing Committee in this matter pursuant to Section 230(10)(e) of the Public Health Law. **John Wiley, Esq.**, Administrative Law Judge, served as the Administrative Officer.

The Petitioner appeared by **Donald P. Berens, Jr., Esq.**, General Counsel, by **Paul Robert Maher, Esq.**, and **Robert Bogan, Esq.**, of Counsel. The Respondent did not appear at the hearing, either in person or by counsel.

Evidence was received and transcripts of these proceedings were made.

After consideration of the entire record, the Hearing Committee issues this Determination and Order.

STATEMENT OF CASE

This case was brought pursuant to Public Health Law Section 230(10)(p). The statute provides for an expedited hearing when a licensee is charged solely with a

violation of Education Law Section 6530(9). In such cases, a licensee is charged with misconduct based upon a prior criminal conviction in New York State or another jurisdiction, or upon a prior administrative adjudication regarding conduct that would amount to professional misconduct, if committed in New York. The scope of an expedited hearing is limited to a determination of the nature and severity of the penalty to be imposed upon the licensee.

In the instant case, the Respondent is charged with professional misconduct pursuant to Education Law Section 6530(9)(d). A copy of the Notice of Referral Proceeding and the Statement of Charges is attached to this Determination and Order as Appendix 1.

FINDINGS OF FACT

The following Findings of Fact were made after a review of the entire record in this matter. Numbers below in parentheses refer to exhibits, denoted by the prefix "Ex." These citations refer to evidence found persuasive by the Hearing Committee in arriving at a particular finding. Conflicting evidence, if any, was considered and rejected in favor of the cited evidence. All Hearing Committee findings were unanimous.

1. Suhung Hann, M.D., a/k/a Richard Suhung Hann, M.D., the Respondent, was authorized to practice medicine in New York State on August 1, 1972, by the issuance of license number 113457 by the New York State Education Department (Petitioner's Ex. 4).

2. On March 27, 2001, the Pennsylvania Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, State Board of Medicine ("Pennsylvania Board"), by an Adjudication

and Order ("Pennsylvania Order"), suspended the Respondent's license to practice medicine for three years, six months of which was an active suspension and the remainder of which was stayed in favor of probation with conditions. The basis for the Pennsylvania Board's sanctions was a finding that the Respondent had engaged in a consensual sexual relationship with a patient from approximately November 1993 to June 1995 (Petitioner's Ex. 5).

HEARING COMMITTEE CONCLUSIONS

The Hearing Committee concludes that the conduct of the Respondent would constitute professional misconduct under the laws of New York State pursuant to:

- New York Education Law Section 6530(17) (exercising undue influence on a patient), and
- New York Education Law Section 6530(20) (moral unfitness).

Contrary to the Statement of Charges, the Hearing Committee concludes that the Respondent's conduct did not violate New York Education Law Section 6530(31) which defines professional misconduct as "[w]illfully harassing, abusing, or intimidating a patient either physically or verbally..." The Petitioner contended that violating the boundaries that prohibit sexual relations between physician and patient constitutes abuse. However, while consensual sexual contact between physician and patient is prohibited conduct, it is not what is normally considered to be physical abuse (and, obviously, is not verbal abuse).

VOTE OF THE HEARING COMMITTEE

SPECIFICATION

"Respondent violated New York Education Law Section 6530(9)(d) by having his license to practice medicine suspended or having had other disciplinary action taken after a disciplinary action was instituted by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency

of another state, where the conduct resulting in the suspension or other disciplinary action would, if committed in New York state, constitute professional misconduct under the laws of New York state..."

VOTE: Sustained (3-0)

HEARING COMMITTEE DETERMINATION

As was held in the Pennsylvania Order, over a period of approximately one year and eight months, the Respondent had a sexual relationship with a female patient. The patient was, as found in the Pennsylvania Order, "emotionally upset prior to the sexual relationship" (Petitioner's Ex. 5, p. 11) and "feeling isolated and alone" (Petitioner's Ex. 5, p. 6). During the proceedings in Pennsylvania, the Respondent admitted the sexual relationship, but argued that it did not constitute professional misconduct because the sexual encounters took place away from the office in which he treated patients. The Hearing Committee concludes that this denial of responsibility for his misconduct raises serious concerns about whether the Respondent can be trusted to refrain from similar misconduct in the future.


The Petitioner recommended that the Respondent's license be revoked. Since the Respondent did not appear at the hearing, the hearing record contains no evidence regarding mitigation, rehabilitation or any other factor that could serve as a reason for rejecting the Petitioner's revocation recommendation. The recommendation will be adopted.

ORDER

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED THAT:

1. The Respondent's license to practice medicine is revoked.
2. This Order shall be effective upon service on the Respondent by personal service or by certified or registered mail.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE THAT:

An adjudicatory proceeding will be held pursuant to the provisions of N.Y. Pub. Health Law § 230(10)(p) and N.Y. State Admin. Proc. Act Sections 301-307 and 401. The proceeding will be conducted before a committee on professional conduct of the State Board for Professional Medical Conduct (Committee) on the 20th day of February 2002, at 10:00 in the forenoon of that day at the Hedley Park Place, 5th Floor, 433 River Street, Troy, New York 12180.

At the proceeding, evidence will be received concerning the allegations set forth in the attached Statement of Charges. A stenographic record of the proceeding will be made and the witnesses at the proceeding will be sworn and examined.

You may appear in person at the proceeding and may be represented by counsel. You may produce evidence or sworn testimony on your behalf. Such evidence or sworn testimony shall be strictly limited to evidence and testimony relating to the nature and severity of the penalty to be imposed upon the licensee. Where the charges are based on the conviction of state law crimes in other jurisdictions, evidence may be offered that would show that the conviction would not be a crime in New York state. The Committee also may limit the number of witnesses whose testimony will be received, as well as the length of time any witness will be permitted to testify.

If you intend to present sworn testimony, the number of witnesses and an estimate of the time necessary for their direct examination must be submitted to the New York State Department of Health, Division of Legal Affairs, Bureau of Adjudication, Hedley Park Place, 5th Floor, 433 River Street, Troy, New York, ATTENTION: HON. TYRONE BUTLER, DIRECTOR, BUREAU OF ADJUDICATION, (hereinafter "Bureau of Adjudication") as well as the Department of Health attorney indicated below, on or before February 11, 2002.

Pursuant to the provisions of N.Y. Public Health Law §230(10)(p), you shall file a written answer to each of the Charges and Allegations in the Statement of Charges no later than ten days prior to the hearing. Any Charge of Allegation not so answered shall be deemed admitted. You may wish to seek the advice of counsel prior to filing such an answer. The answer shall be filed with the Bureau of Adjudication, at the address indicated above, and a copy shall be forwarded to the attorney for the Department of Health whose name appears below. You may file a brief and affidavits with the Committee. Six copies of all such papers you wish to submit must be filed with the Bureau of Adjudication at the address indicated above on or before February 11, 2002, and a copy of all papers must be served on the same date on the Department of Health attorney indicated below. Pursuant to Section 301(5) of the State Administrative Procedure Act, the Department, upon reasonable notice, will provide at no charge a qualified interpreter of the deaf to interpret the proceedings to, and the testimony of, any deaf person.

The proceeding may be held whether or not you appear. Please note that requests for adjournments must be made in writing to the Bureau of Adjudication, at the address indicated above, with a copy of the request to the attorney for the Department of Health, whose name appears below, at least five days prior to the scheduled date of the proceeding. Adjournment requests are not routinely granted. Claims of court engagement will require detailed affidavits of actual engagement. Claims of illness will require medical documentation. Failure to obtain an attorney within a reasonable period of time prior to the proceeding will not be grounds for an adjournment.

The Committee will make a written report of its findings, conclusions as to guilt, and a determination. Such determination may be reviewed by the Administrative Review Board for Professional Medical Conduct.

CHARGES

SUHUNG HANN M.D., AKA RICHARD SUHUNG HANN, M.D., the Respondent, was authorized to practice medicine in New York state on August 2, 1972, by the issuance of license number 113457 by the New York State Education Department.

FACTUAL ALLEGATIONS

A. On or about March 27, 2001, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of State, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, State Board of Medicine, (hereinafter "Pennsylvania Board"), by an Adjudication and Order (hereinafter "Pennsylvania Order"), suspended Respondent's license to practice medicine for three (3) years, six (6) months of which shall be active, the remainder of the suspension shall be stayed in favor of probation under conditions, based on having engaged in a sexual and personal relationship with a patient from on or about October 1993, to on or about June 1995.

B. The conduct resulting in the Pennsylvania Board disciplinary action against Respondent would constitute misconduct under the laws of New York state, pursuant to the following sections of New York state Law:

1. New York Education Law 6530(17) (exercising undue influence on a patient);
2. New York Education Law §6530(20) (moral unfitness); and/or
3. New York Education Law §6530(31) (willfully harassing, abusing, or intimidating a patient).

SPECIFICATION

Respondent violated New York Education Law §6530(9)(d) by having his license to practice medicine suspended or having had other disciplinary action taken after a disciplinary action was instituted by a duly authorized professional disciplinary agency of another state, where the conduct resulting in the suspension or other disciplinary action would, if committed in New York state, constitute professional misconduct under the laws New York state, in that Petitioner charges:
